- **HOMEWORK** Homework is due each Friday. Assignments will be posted online one week before they are due (www.gsbc.edu/classes/rflood.html). Staple all papers together and turn them in as a packet.

EN101 Homework Guidelines

- 1. **Workbook** exercises Do assigned exercise sets from *College Grammar and Composition Workshop*. Tear out assignments from the book and turn them in with the weekly homework. The suggested reading in the UBB (*Handbook of Grammar and Composition*) explains the grammar concepts needed to complete workbook exercises.
- 2. **Vocabulary** The list of vocabulary words for EN101 may be found at our class Website (www.gsbc.edu/classes/rflood.html). A set of ten words will be assigned each week. Follow the directions on the vocabulary homework sheet.
 - For five of the ten words, write definitive sentences. Write an original sentence <u>using the word in</u> such a way that the context shows the definition of the word.

Sample ways of showing the definition of a word by its context:

- 1. Meaning stated with punctuation. Ex: The students in Mr. Grey's Business Math class will learn about investing by making **mock**—pretend or sham—investments in the stock market.
- 2. Meaning stated without punctuation. Ex: The daily ridicule Gus faced at the bus stop was just part of the ritual **mocking** he had learned to ignore.
- 3. Meaning given by contrast. Ex: It was clear from the expression on his face and the tone of his voice that his comments were genuine rather than **mocking**.
- 4. Meaning given by inference. Ex: The cartoon of President Carter with a peanut-shaped head was completely inappropriate because it **mocked** the President.

Note: Test your sentence to make sure it's definitive by trying to substitute in a word that means something completely different from the vocabulary word. If you can fit in a word with a different meaning, your sentence is NOT definitive. For example, the following sentence is <u>not definitive</u> because the words slapped, tripped, ignored, or embarrassed could be used instead of mocked.

James became angry when Shelly mocked him in front of his friends.

- 3. **Spelling** The list of spelling words for EN101 may be found at our class Website. A set of ten words will be assigned each week. <u>Thoughtfully</u> and neatly write each word three times in cursive. Make sure you spell it right!
- 4. **Diction** The EN101 diction list may be found at our class Website. Read through the assigned entries and be prepared to explain them in class and be prepared to be quizzed on them.
- 5. **Writing** We will be doing two types of writing for this class:
 - a. Journal Writing this will be handwritten in your composition book. This writing is to get you comfortable expressing your ideas. It is the kind of writing you can do to play with language. This writing will be graded on a done/not done basis. Please see the Reading Journal information on the Web site:

 - b. Compositions and writing assignments these will vary from week to week. Some may just be a paragraph long; others may be a few pages. Follow the directions on the weekly homework sheet carefully. Compositions must be typed 12-pt Times New Roman and double spaced. Writing assignments WILL be shared with classmates, so only write ideas that you are comfortable sharing with others.
- 6. **Reading** reading comprehension homework will vary from week to week. Follow the directions on the weekly homework sheet carefully.
